Letter from Chair of the Board

At the beginning of 2017, the Board of Directors of Amirah drafted three goals for the year. First, we wanted to establish Amirah as the state-of-the-art program for other organizations seeking to build safe houses for women who have been sex trafficked. We recognize that this is a long-term and continually evolving goal, but in 2017 we chose to take an intentional step toward it. Second, we wanted to build on the strong financial foundation that had been laid in 2016. Third, we wanted to work toward expanding our services either in breadth or location.

We are happy to report that our work in 2017 was successful in all three areas. Our safe home program, which has been through refinement and improvement, is operating at a very high level. We are so proud of the quality and commitment of our staff who run and support the women and the operation of our safe home. Women's lives are being changed! And Amirah is now the sought-after expert for others seeking to build safe homes - meaning that even more women's lives will be changed.

God once again blessed Amirah financially in 2017 and this year we sought to steward those resources well - not only for sustainability but also for future growth. As you will see in this report, we ended the year in a strong financial position which will enable us to extend our services in 2018. To this end, we made the decision to launch our "Ending the Game" initiative to help women who have been sex trafficked, but do not need the services of a safe home. We also actively began the process of creating either a new safe home or an emergency shelter in other parts of New England.

Truly, Amirah is at a very strong place and we have you, our donors, to thank for walking alongside us and supporting our efforts. As a Board, we have seen God's hand directly at work in this ministry and we are thankful to have partners like you working with us.

Journeys of Liberation

In 2017, we were privileged to serve 23 women through our home and other after care opportunities.

The numbers below are from the women who have entered our safe home program in 2017. These numbers reflect more than just blood, sweat, and tears, they reflect **HOPE** living in a woman once again. Why Whole Person Care Matters

Every victim of sex trafficking has experienced complex trauma. The results of complex trauma in the life of survivors can be seen in their difficulty to regulate emotions and impulses. What this looks like to an average person is a woman who is just another drug addict. She is harsh and often mean. She can't sit still, and has to take frequent smoke breaks.

The reason we believe wholeheartedly in the Whole Person Care approach is because of the effects of complex trauma. If we only provided a bed for her, she would still blow up in the face of another person who looks at her the wrong way. If we only worked on her mental health, she would still have extreme shame and be unable to hold onto a job for longer than a few weeks.

Whole Person Care matters because it leaves no stone unturned. As she does this work, we watch her entire life be restored. While every woman comes to us with her own personal goals, our goals for them are:

- ❖ Physical – Stabilization in physical self over time
- ❖ Mental – Function fully in present reality
- ❖ Emotional – Regulate emotions & work through trauma
- ❖ Social – Learn communication skills
- ❖ Vocational – Discover life-affirming path
- ❖ Spiritual – Understand and believe in forgiveness, breaking the cycle of shame

As you can imagine, this kind of work does not happen overnight. This is why our program is meant to be long-term (around 2-years), because we do not believe that bandaids will help complex trauma.

The Story of Jessie

When we think of Jessie, we think of a lot of firsts. Jessie was the first woman to come into the safe home when it opened in October of 2015. She went through a lot of firsts with the staff - first flat tire, first time getting health insurance, first time having to educate a doctor on what a sex trafficking victim is.

Despite all of the stumbles along the way, Jessie was committed and showed resiliency. She pushed through depression, she worked hard each day to prove to us and herself that she wanted her life back. She stepped boldly into a leadership role in the home with the other women. We are proud of every woman that comes into the Amirah home, but there is something about having your first one graduate.

In December of 2017, Jessie stepped forward and received her graduation certificate from Amirah. She continues to be a part of the Amirah community, like every woman who goes through the program is. She is now working with Rebecca Bender Ministries being trained by survivors to become a Survivor Leader.

We use the phrase often that we watch a woman transform from the slave she used to be to the woman she was created to be. For Jessie, we are watching and supporting her as she continues on her journey of liberation, and are excited for the day when she steps out as the leader that she was created to be!

2017 Hike 4 Hope

On August 19th, 2017, 48 people from the Amirah Community hiked up Mount Washington (the tallest mountain in New England) in support of the women of Amirah. This was our second annual Hike 4 Hope. Along with the 48 people in the community, two survivors from Amirah made it to the top, all 6,288 feet!

Hike 4 hope has become one of our favorite community efforts to support the women of Amirah raising awareness and funds for them. Each woman at Amirah climbs her own personal mountain of recovery each day; it seems only fitting that we support them by climbing a mountain for them!
